Types of Courses

- A Level
- Vocational options such as BTEC, Cambridge National and Cambridge Technical
- Apprenticeship
- T Level



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Get the Jump: explore your education and training choices | National Careers Service

- 1. Sixth Form Colleges: offer traditional A levels and BTEC courses up to Level 3 (A level equivalent qualification) and new 'T levels'
- 2. Further Education Colleges: offer a range of vocational courses including apprenticeships, up to Level 3 (A level standard)

Types of Courses

WHAT QUALIFICATIONS ARE THERE? 8 DOCTORATE (PhD)

This graphic shows each qualification and its level of study. For example, both T Levels and A Levels are Level 3 qualifications, along with Applied General Qualifications and Advanced Apprenticeships. The level of a Foundation Degree is not as high as that of an Undergraduate Degree, but it is the same as a Level 5 Diploma.



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A Level

- Need GCSE grades 4-9 in 5 or more subjects.
- You choose 3 subjects to study for two years



- Additional entry requirements for some subjects e.g may require a grade 6 or above in certain subjects to access the A level
- Academic study, based on exams, and in a few subjects coursework
- Traditional route to university
- Choose a range of subjects for the career directions that interest you
- A big step up from GCSE

BTEC



BTECs are an alternative to A-Levels

- Cover a whole range of academic levels
- BTECs at levels 1 and 2 are equivalent to GCSEs, level 3 to A-Levels, and levels 4 -7 hold the same status of achievement as a degree

BTECs are vocational qualifications

- Rather than traditional academic courses.
- Typical subjects offered at BTEC level include Business Studies, Travel and Tourism, Engineering and Information Technology, Sport, Music
- You can't study subjects like History or English at BTEC level.
- BTEC courses are continually assessed, a mixture of theory and practical

BTECs are assessed differently

- One of the main differences between BTECs and A-Levels is the way they are assessed
- A-Levels mainly involve two years of study geared towards a few big tests at the end, whereas BTECs are continually assessed via coursework and practical projects

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Apprenticeships

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- A skilled qualification which teaches you the **techniques that you need for a specific job role**, whilst you are employed within the workplace.
- You're employed to do a real job while studying for a formal qualification usually for one day a week either at a college or training centre.
- By the end of your apprenticeship, you'll hopefully have gained the skills and knowledge needed to either succeed in your chosen career or progress onto the next apprenticeship level.
- Did you know that 19% of Advanced (Level 3) apprentices progress on to Higher Education, either through a Higher Level Apprenticeship (Level 4, 5, 6 or 7) or through a traditional University degree which can be sponsored by their employer?

Apprenticeships

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- Accounting apprenticeships in areas such as bills and expenses, payroll and taxes, plus banking apprenticeships.
- <u>Business apprenticeships</u> in business administration, business development, consultancy and leadership.
- <u>Construction apprenticeships</u> in building, plumbing and quantity surveying.
- <u>Engineering apprenticeships</u> in civil, mechanical and electrical engineering.
- Healthcare apprenticeships, in areas such as dentistry and <u>nursing</u>.
- <u>Human resources (HR) apprenticeships</u> for those looking to progress in support, consultancy and management roles.
- <u>IT apprenticeships</u> in information security and software development.
- <u>Law apprenticeships</u> offered at paralegal, legal executive and solicitor level.
- <u>Marketing apprenticeships</u> in digital marketing, social media and public relations (PR).
- <u>Media apprenticeships</u> in the television, radio and film industries.
- <u>Retail apprenticeships</u> for those in buying, merchandising and management roles. There are also <u>sales apprenticeships</u>.
- <u>Transport apprenticeships</u> in a range of logistics, road, railway, automotive and airline industry roles.

Apprenticeships

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How to apply

- <u>Find an apprenticeship</u> (findapprenticeship.service.gov.uk)
- If you do an apprenticeship through an FE college, it will often start in September, however there are lots of mid-year opportunities too if you're studying through an ITP (Independent Training Provider).
- Most of the time, you apply directly to the employer.

Technical Levels

- New courses which started in September 2020
- The equivalent to 3 A Levels.
- 2-year course



- Offer students a mixture of classroom learning and 'on-the-job' experience
- Each T Level includes an in-depth industry placement that lasts at least 45 days.
- Students get valuable experience in the workplace; employers get early sight of the new talent in their industry.
- T Level students spend 80% of the course in the classroom, learning the skills and knowledge that employers need. The other 20% is a meaningful industry placement, where they put these skills into action.
- Opens the door into skilled employment, further study (such as a degree) or a degree apprenticeship

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Support

What careers education and support is available in school?

- Colleges visit pupils in assemblies
- Post-16 Information evening, Apprenticeship Fair and Careers Fair
- Read college websites and prospectus available online or in the careers section of the library
- Visit Open Evenings for all colleges
- Tutor programme in tutor time: support with writing an **application**
- Individual careers interviews with our careers advisor (before Christmas of Year 11)
- Breaktime drop in sessions with our careers advisor every Tuesday



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- Investigate the **different types** of qualification
- How do you learn best? Consider the different ways you are assessed for the qualifications and the different levels of qualification; this will be dependent on the grades you achieve at GCSE
- Have a Plan A and Plan B
- Visit your local colleges / virtual tours and open event
- Apply to more than one college
- Consider and apply for apprenticeships
- Choose what YOU want to do not what your friends are doing
- Choose something you **enjoy** and you are good at.

How do I apply for college?

The colleges will each come into school and talk through their application processes and their deadlines during their assembly with you.

The website for the college is the best place to look to get started, as applications are digital. Each college has a slightly different process.

Deadlines:

- Peter Symonds has the earliest deadline 11th December
- Sparsholt **31**st December, although they will accept late applications too
- Barton Peveril 19th January
- Eastleigh are slightly more flexible and accept applications up until June.

Although you will need to state your courses when you apply, don't worry if you're unsure – these are provisional only up until August when you actually enrol – so you can change your mind!



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Year 11 Work Experience 2024

When

- For 1 or 2 weeks (some companies will only offer 3 days, which is also fine)
- w/c 24th June and/or w/c 1st July 2024

- Builds confidence and self-esteem
- Builds a CV
- Develops transferable skills

- Speak to family and friends
