

# The Westgate Lower School Sports Premium 2023-24

## PE and Sports Premium for Primary Schools

In 2013 the Government announced that they would be spending £450 million over the next three academic years to help fund primary school sport, this is called the School Sport Premium. Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer and should use the premium to:

- ❖ develop or add to the PE and sport activities that the school already offers
- ❖ make improvements now that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

Schools have the freedom to spend the money however they choose, but this must be towards improving their provision of PE and Sport to give children the opportunity to develop a healthy lifestyle and cannot be spent on the delivery of the Core PE curriculum.
